COURSE OBJECTIVES (49A)

In this course students have the opportunity to learn the elements of painting using a variety of techniques, materials, and tools. Structure, composition, paint handling, light affects, and color theory are stressed in relationship to the painting process and a variety of subject matter. Students will study painting through direct observation and imagination.

Students will be required and encouraged to assess their own work and the work of others during critiques and class discussions. Critiques will be used as a way to increase vocabulary related to painting and aesthetics, increase confidence in analysis and verbal communication, and to analyze the creative process. (49A-D)
